# Norway Maple Acer platanoides



This shade-tolerant tree is listed as **very invasive** in Maine, growing 40-60' or more, with dark-greyish bark that has **shallow vertical grooves** with age, somewhat like corduroy. (Native sugar maple has shaggy bark).

- Leaves are opposite each other on the stem, with 5-7 pointy-tipped lobes. During growing season, white sap exudes if the leaf stem is removed from the branch.
   Yellow leaves stay on late in the fall, giving this tree an extended growing period.
- Stems have a solid white pith and large, **rounded** bud at their tips that bleed white sap if cut.
- Flowers are yellowish-green from April–May before the leaves develop.
- Seeds spread 180 degrees wide like green bowties,  $1 \frac{1}{2} 2^{"}$ , then turn yellow before brown in fall.



### **HOW TO CONTROL:**

- Pull or dig young plants anytime the soil is wet.
  But this tree will re-sprout, so monitor and repeat.
- For larger trees, cut tree down, or cut overlapping gashes into bark anytime except spring or early summer, and paint the cut surface with 25-40% triclopyr, if beyond 25' from water. Monitor and repeat on re-sprouts in subsequent years.
