<p data-bbox="105 1889 1406 1964">Highbush Blueberry – <i>Vaccinium corymbosum</i>, Grows from 6’-8’ in moist, well-drained soil, in sun or part shade. Fall leaves turn bright red. Berries attract birds and humans.</p> <p data-bbox="105 1964 1325 2040">Fragrant Sumac – <i>Rhus aromatica</i>, Grows 2’-3’ tall and 6’-8’ wide, in sun or part shade dry soil, with bright orange to red fall color.</p> <p data-bbox="105 2040 683 2072">https://extension.umaine.edu/publications/2500e/</p> <p data-bbox="105 2112 1503 2222">Northern spicebush – <i>Lindera benzoin</i>, Native to Maine, grows in shady, moist places, has green-yellow flowers in spring before sweetly aromatic leaves emerge, leaves turn yellow in fall. Hosts spicebush swallowtail butterfly (<i>Papilio Troilus</i>).
